Oh, How Good It Is sets its scriptural foundation in Psalm 133:1 - "How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity!" This theme of unity is illustrated through the collaborative efforts of the four uniquely gifted and experienced musicians who composed this engaging and theologically rich congregational hymn. Keith and Kristyn Getty wrote the lyrics, and Stuart Townend worked with Ross Holmes to compose a singable melody and adaptable arrangement intended to accommodate various instruments and worship service styles. Fun fact: Holmes has performed as a fiddler with the popular British folk-rock band, Mumford and Sons.

The Text focuses on a hymn theme that is often overlooked by current worship music: the Body of Christ. The message, according to composer Stuart Townend, describes one of God's greatest blessings to his people: the joy and vitality of a shared life; the "many wonderful aspects of being part of God's family: a place of acceptance and belonging, sharing one another's joys and sorrows, learning to forgive and be forgiven, experiencing the presence of God through our unity, and being a shining light to the community around us because of our shared love." When we join our voices in this musical Call to Worship, we are affirming our unity and the many blessings that come from our corporate worship and fellowship.

Food for thought: Pastor John Gardner states "the act of community-minded, congregational singing requires cooperation unlike any other group endeavor, and joining our voices in public statements of faith bonds us to each other and encourages our faith like nothing else can. And, to those looking on, it is an act of testimony speaking volumes more than any one of us could say on his own."
